


To tell the story of MILES and help researchers identify common knowledge gaps, new hypotheses, and new opportunities for collaboration.



What is the data map?

The data map is both a database and a visualization tool. Using graph theory and social network analysis, we interrelate the datasets collected within the MILES program to the social-ecological system (SES) questions that those data help inform.







What information is being collected?












Contribute
